THE PRINCE OF WALES.—The Saturday afternoon, his Imperial Highness the Grand Duke Michael, accompanied by his Archchancellor Baron Brunsow and Count Wernicke, visited Apsley House, to visit the Duke of Wellington. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, attended by Baron Knesebeck, and his Imperial Highness the Grand Duke Michael of Russia, attended by his suite, honoured his Archchancellor Baron Brunsow with their company at dinner, on Saturday, at Apsley House. His Imperial Highness the Grand Duke Michael returned to Moscow's Grand at halfpast five o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, from visiting the Queen and her Royal Highness Princess Albert, at Windsor Castle. We understand that Dr. Wylie, by her Majesty's command, shortly after the Grand Duke's arrival on Monday afternoon at the Castle, was introduced into the royal presence, and the Queen, who is now in her complimentary residence, stated it was her Majesty's wish that before that gentleman's departure from this country he should receive some token of the royal favour, and the Queen was graciously pleased, in the presence of Princess Albert and members of the royal household, to confer on the respected doctor the honour of knighthood. Dr. Wylie is nephew of the famous Wylie, Esq., M.D., prominent physician of the late and popular Dispensary of Bristol, and head of the medical staff of Russia, in whose service he has been upwards of fifty years. Dr. Wylie, in 1812, was knighted by George IV., then Prince of Wales, at Apsley House, and subsequently created a Baronet.
